extensive community and business awareness, but participants also learn about the importance of volunteerism in our community and how they can get involved to help create a more vibrant future for Douglas County.

The leadership program is open to both principals and employees of Roseburg Area Chamber of Commerce members. If you or one of your employees are a future Douglas County community and business leader, then you'll want to be part of Project Leadership Roseburg.

Applicants may be either employer-sponsored or self-sponsored. The cost of the program is \$775 for Roseburg Chamber members; \$975 for non-RACC-members. There is a \$50 application fee which is deducted from the cost of tuition for selected participants.

Advocating in Defense of Local Business

An Oregon Legislative Update

Good news and bad news in the aftermath of the April 9 first Chamber deadline of the Oregon Legislative Session. Good news, HB 3556, an attempt to divert transient lodging taxes (TLT) away from its intended use and a bill RACC opposed, died in committee. The bad news, the legislation will be resurrected in a "zombie" bill, HB 3962 which RACC will oppose and issue an "Action Alert" when appropriate. Similarly, bad news, HB 3119 which would have delayed Oregon DEQ's "Advanced Clean Trucks" rule until 2027 and which RACC supports died in committee but, good news, may see daylight in a bill TBA in a future "Action Alert" to support.

Some Remaining Bills of Concern

SB 916 Unemployment Benefits for Striking Workers. This bill passed the Senate with the bare minimum 16 votes and is now in the House for consideration. SB 916 extends unemployment benefits for striking workers in a stunning reversal of decades of unemployment policy that allowed for benefits only for those not employed through no fault of their own. This bill appears to be on track to be labor's big win for the 2025 session.

HB 2548 and HB 3838 Creation of Workforce Standards Boards. These bills reflect an emerging trend that would establish new industry regulatory boards that would determine employment and wage law for specific industries (these specifically, farm workforce and home health care workforce). This is a grave threat to Oregon employers as the "Standards Board" concept can be applied to any industry.

SB 174 "Bad Faith" Insurance Lawsuits. This bill continues to be the most costly of the remaining insurance and liability-related issues. 'Bad Faith' legislation is an ill-conceived idea that has driven up will insurance premiums for commercial property and casualty policies in states where it has been passed.

SB 426 Property Owner & Contractor Liability. This bill which would hold property owners and general contractors liable for any unpaid wages at the subcontractor level. The bill directly punishes the wrong parties for wage theft at the subcontractor level and will have a chilling effect on commercial construction.

HB 2957 90-Day Notice to Sue. This bill eliminates the 90-day 'notice to sue' limitation, extending the timeline that an employment claim can be filed after BOLI concludes there is no evidence to support a claim. Current law gives people a time limit of 90-days to sue an employer after BOLI concludes its investigation and finds in favor of the employer.

HB 3489 Timber Tax. Proposes to impose a severance tax on timber, increasing the tax burden to the sector by roughly 800% while defunding the Oregon Forest Resources Institute.

HB 3197 and HB 3940 Alcohol Taxes. HB 3197 would add an alcohol sales tax and HB 3940 would places a surcharge on sales of beverage containers to fund wildfire mitigation. Both would require a three-fifths supermajority in order to pass.

Some Good Bills Still Alive

HB 3921 Relating to UGB. Would approve city of Roseburg and Douglas County's 2024 ordinances that provided for amendments to the city's urban growth boundary, the city boundaries and the city and county's comprehensive plan and land use regulations.

- Advocated in defense of our local business community under the chamber's 2023-24 Public Affairs & Legislative Agenda, specifically during the 2024 Oregon Legislative Session, submitting in testimony in opposition to antibusiness legislation and in support of pro-business legislation.

Some Good Bills Still Alive (Cont.)

SB 512 Rock Creek Fish Hatchery. Would direct the State Fish and Wildlife Commission to operate a summer steelhead fish hatchery at the Rock Creek Hatchery and release the hatchery fish into the North Umpqua River.

SJR 11 Oregon Constitution Re Lottery Revenues. Proposes an amendment to the Oregon Constitution to require a certain percentage of lottery revenues to be expended for wildfire prevention, suppression or management. Refers the proposed amendment to the people of Oregon for vote.

Important upcoming session deadlines: May 9/post work session; May 14/quarterly revenue forecast; May 23/second Chamber deadline; June 18/target Sine Die; and, June 29/Constitutional Sine Die.

Since 1989, nearly 700 business people have graduated from Project Leadership Roseburg, and many of today's respected Douglas County business and civic leaders are graduates of this esteemed program. Now in its 36th year, the mission of the Roseburg Area Chamber of Commerce's leadership program is to educate, inspire, and strengthen community-minded individuals through increased business and community awareness and to promote civic activism through volunteerism.

Not your typical leadership program, Project Leadership provides participants with a comprehensive awareness of the many facets of Douglas County and they gain a deeper understanding of how our community works, directly from its leaders. The nine-month program not only imparts knowledge about our region, but fosters dedication to our community as participants learn about opportunities for involvement to help create a more vibrant future for Douglas County.

Making a Commitment to Leadership

Project Leadership Roseburg requires a two-year commitment from participants. During the first year, participants attend eight day-long sessions, one per month. Each month, participants will attend a full-day workshop, panel presentations/briefings, and/or tours on different session topics.

Project Leadership challenges its participants to become more involved in local politics, the chamber, community and civic organizations—all for the future betterment of Douglas County. This involvement will start soon after participants "graduate" from the leadership program in May. They may assist chamber staff with facilitation of workshop sessions for a new class of Project Leadership participants; thus, fulfilling their

second-year commitment to the program.

Now Accepting Applications

The chamber is currently accepting applications for the 2025-26 Project Leadership class. Space is limited. Applicants may be employer-sponsored or self-sponsored. The cost for the program for Roseburg Area Chamber members is \$775; the cost for non-member participants is \$975. Roseburg Area Chamber members will be given priority and acceptance is on a first-come/first-approved basis. Only one candidate per company may be accepted.
